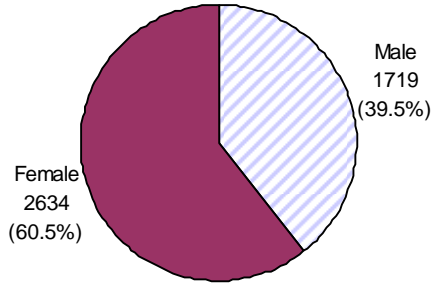

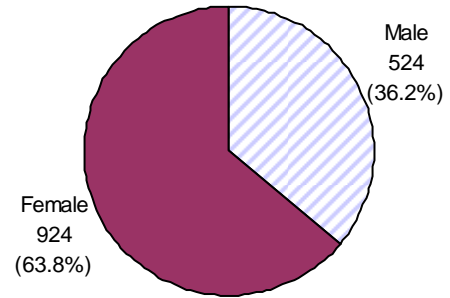

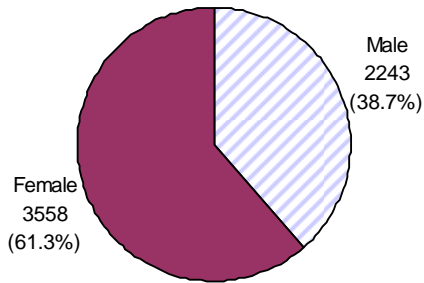
Summer 03 - Winter 04 Full-time Gender Distribution



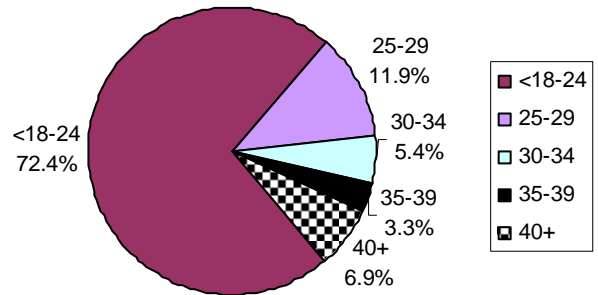
Summer 03 - Winter 03 Part-time Gender Distribution



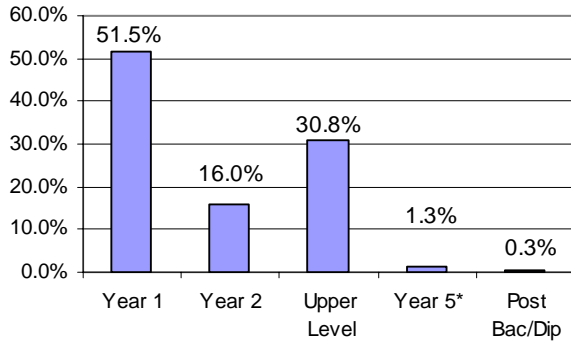
Total Summer 03 - Winter 04 Gender Distribution



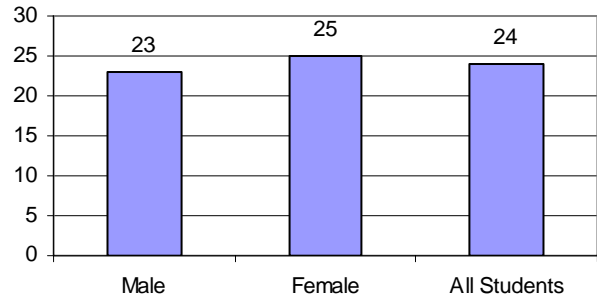
Total Age Distribution Summer 03 - Winter 04

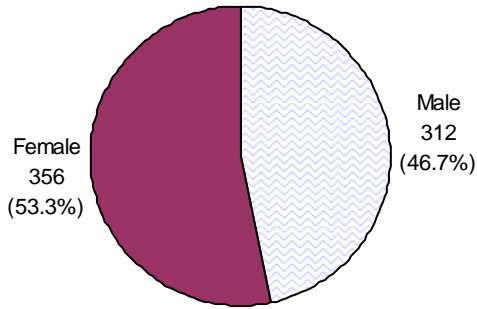

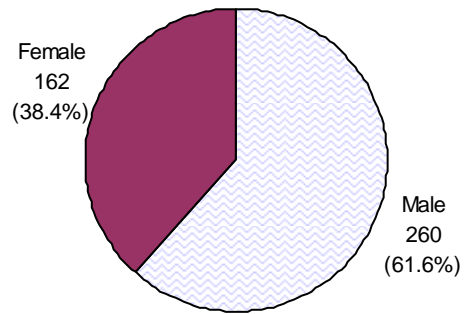

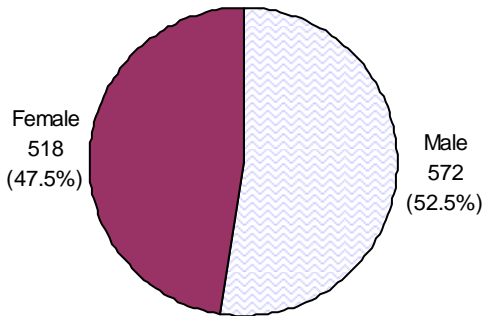
Summer 03 - Winter 04 Full-time / Gender Distribution



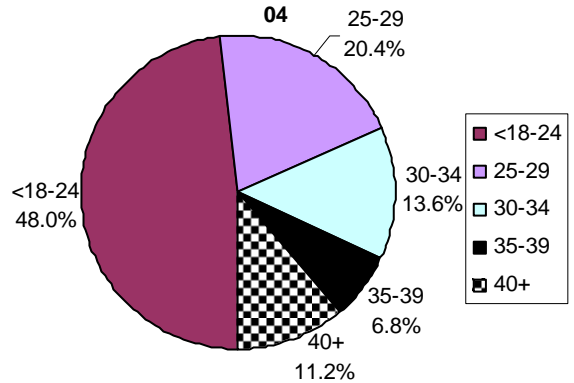
Summer 03 - Winter 04 Part-time / Gender Distribution



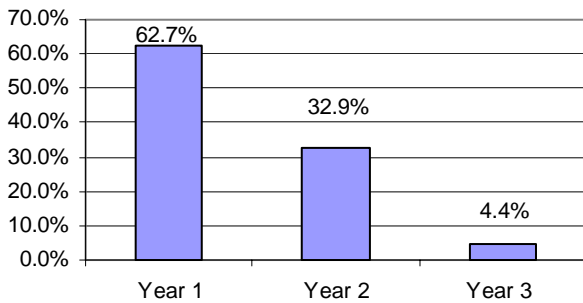
Total Summer 03 - Winter 04 / Gender Distribution



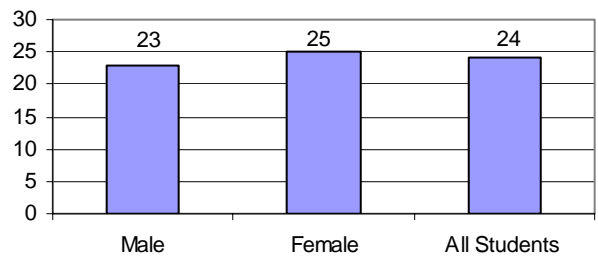
Total Age Distribution / Summer 03 - Winter 04

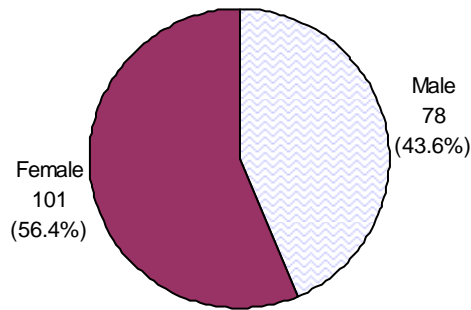

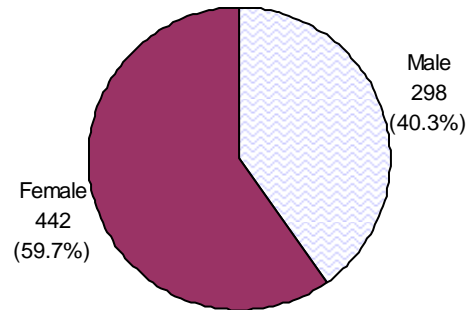

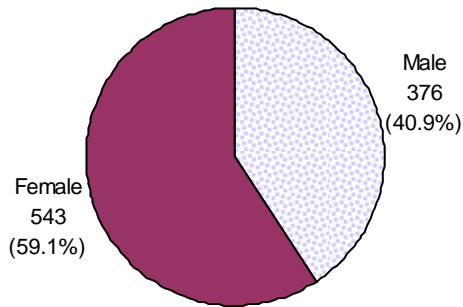
Summer 03 - Winter 04 Full-time / Gender Distribution



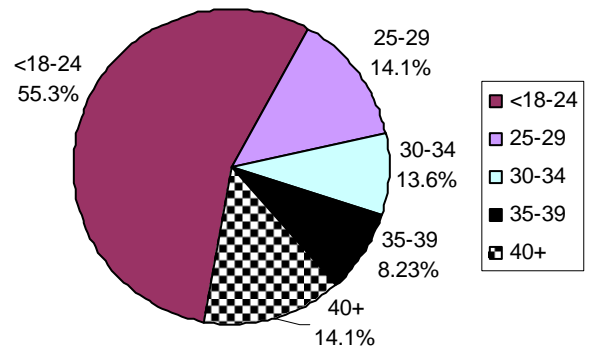
Summer 03 - Winter 04 Part-time / Gender Distribution



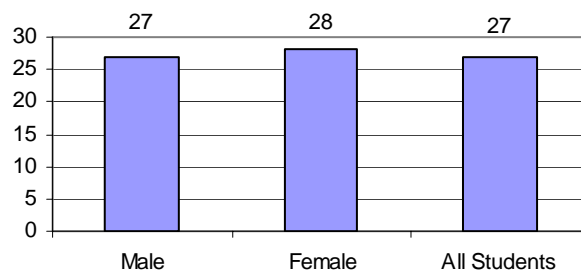
Total Summer 03 - Winter 04 Gender Distribution

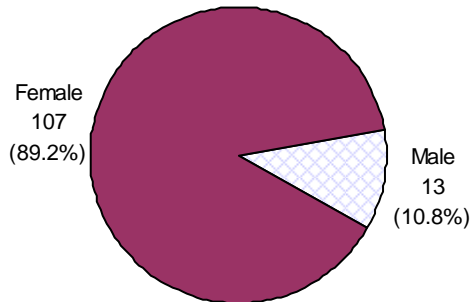

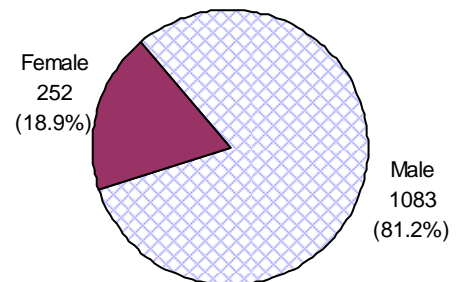

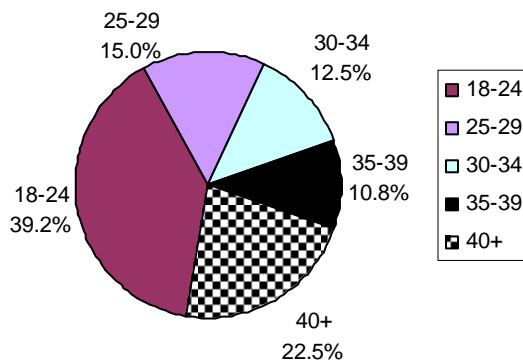
Total Summer 03 - Winter 04 Semesterized Vocational Gender Distribution



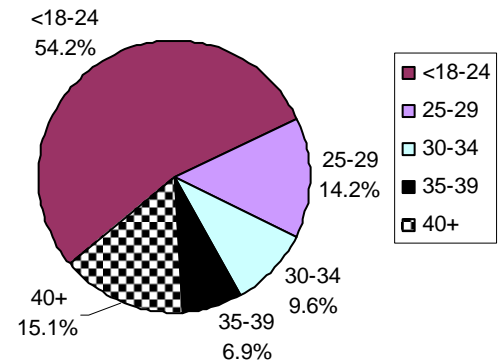
Total Summer 03 - Winter 04 Non-Semesterized Vocational Gender Distribution



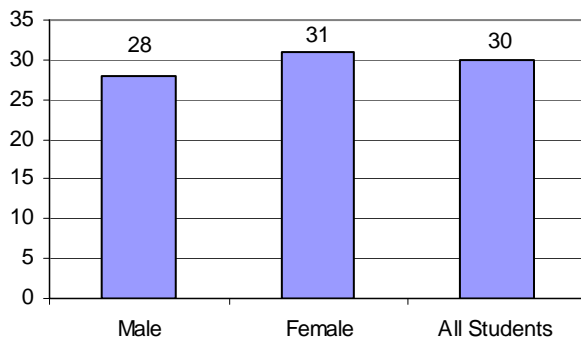
Total Summer 03 - Winter 04 Semesterized Vocational Age Distribution



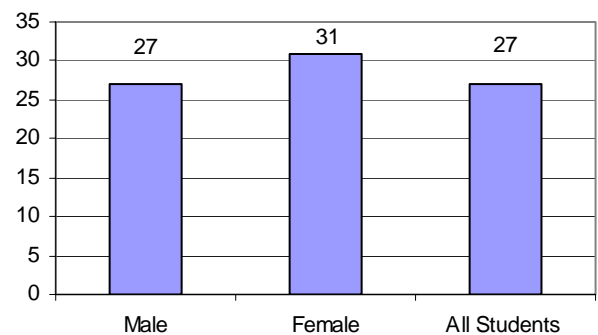
Total Summer 03 - Winter 04 Non-Semesterized Vocational Age Distribution

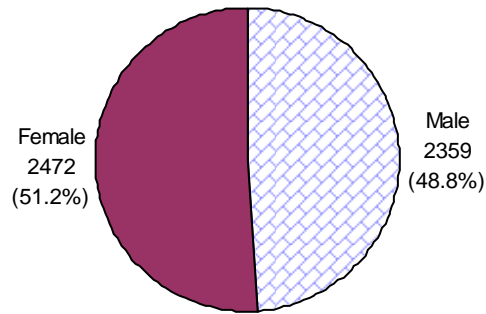

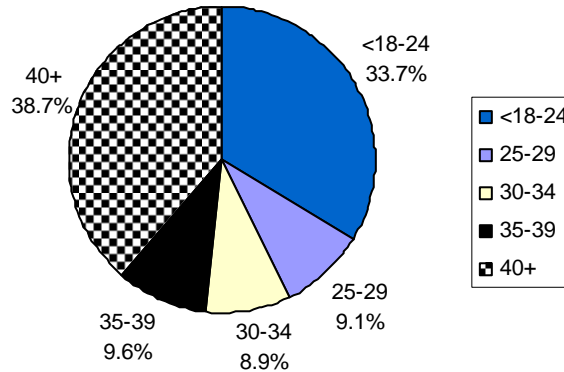

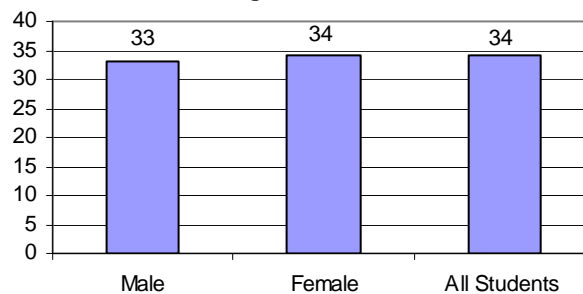
Total Summer 03 - Winter 04 Gender Distribution

Average Age as of Jan 01/2004 for Continuing Studies Students



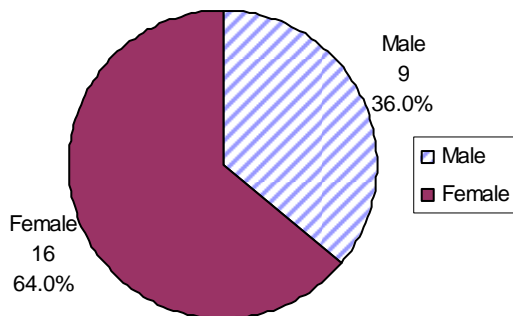

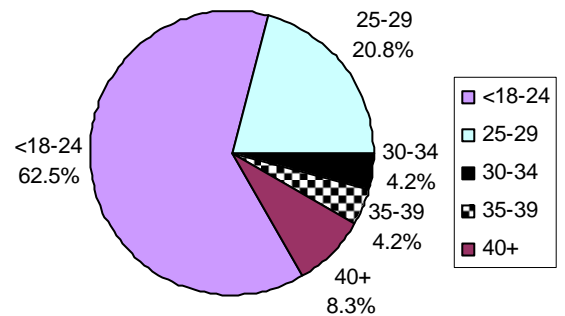

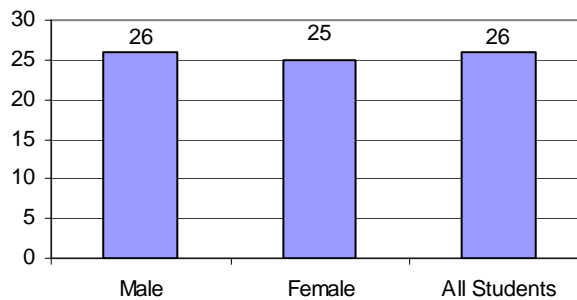
Summer 03 - Winter 04 Gender Distribution



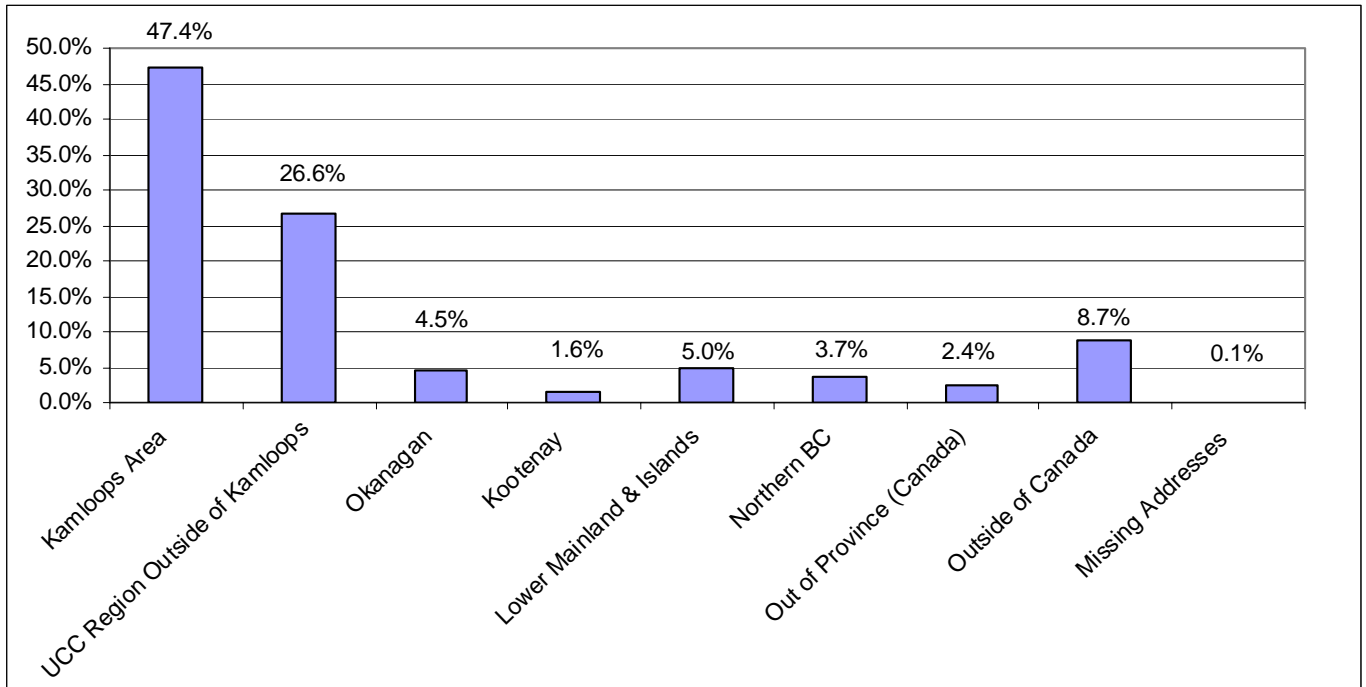
Total Age Distribution Summer 03 - Winter 04

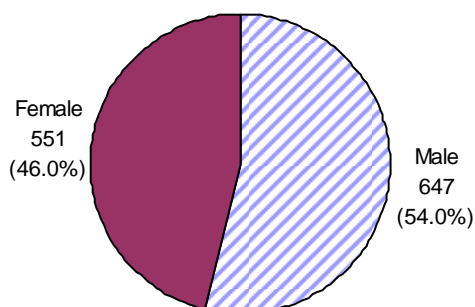

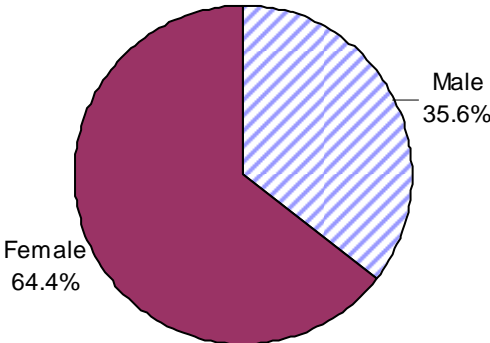

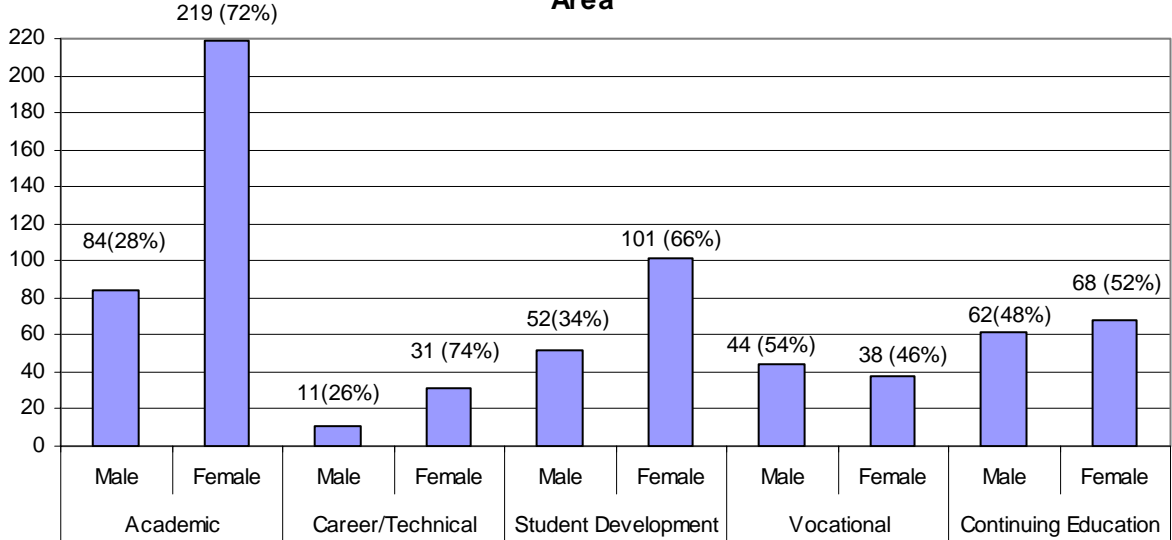

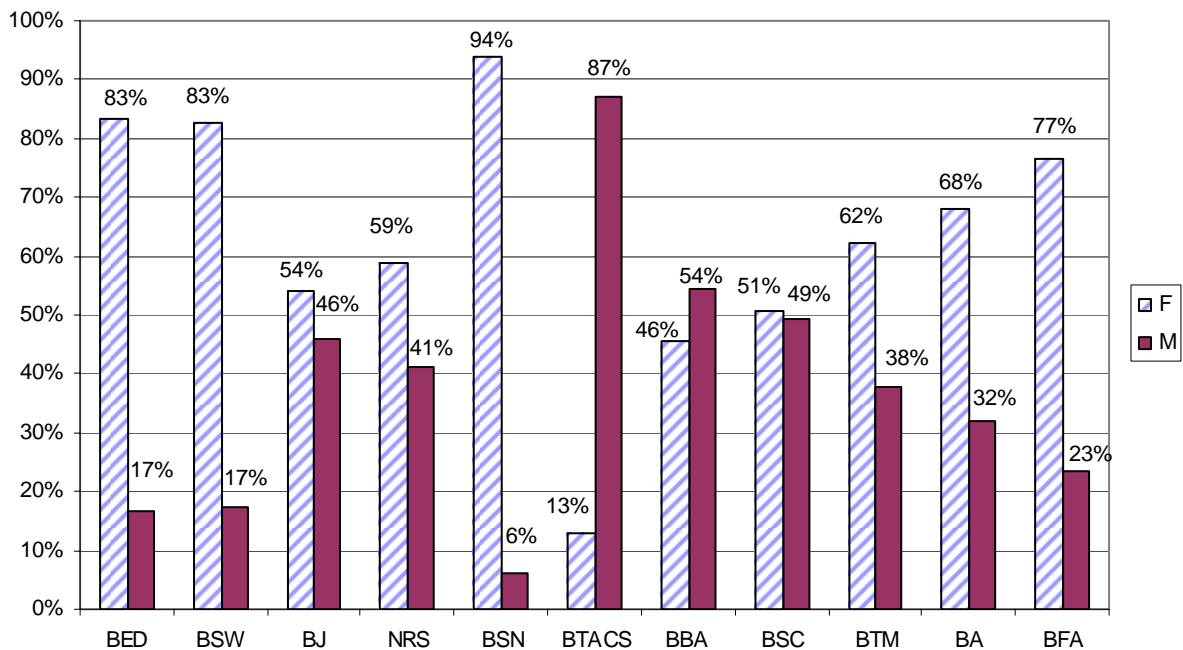

Gender Distribution by Degree: 2003-2004

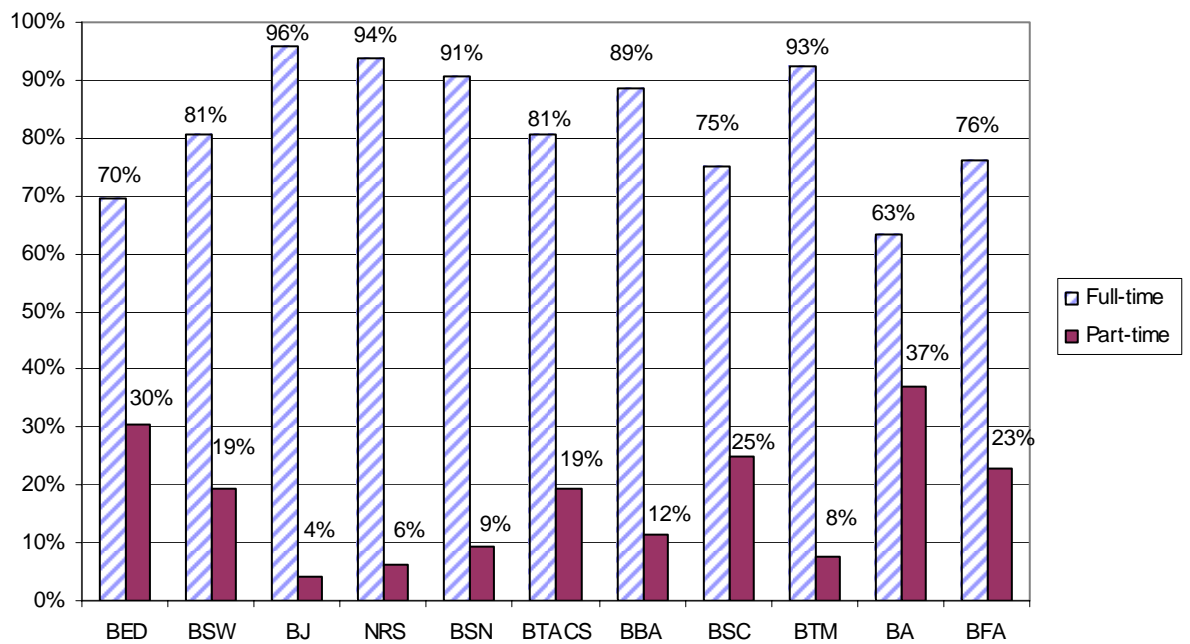

Course Pass Rates 2003-2004



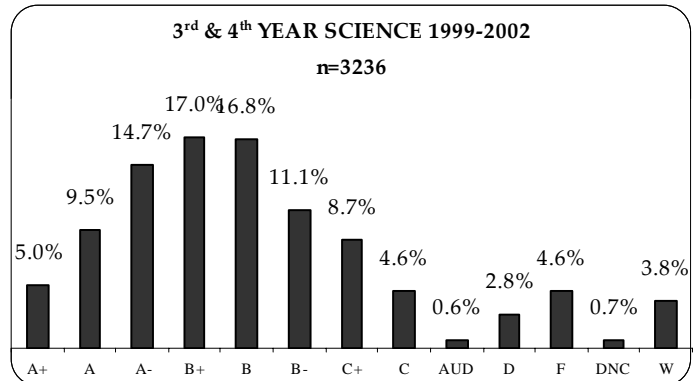
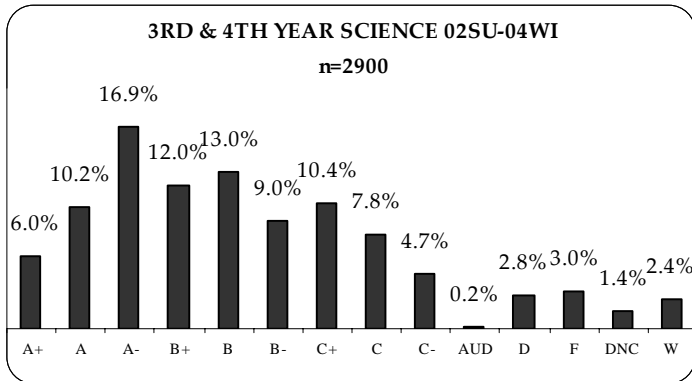
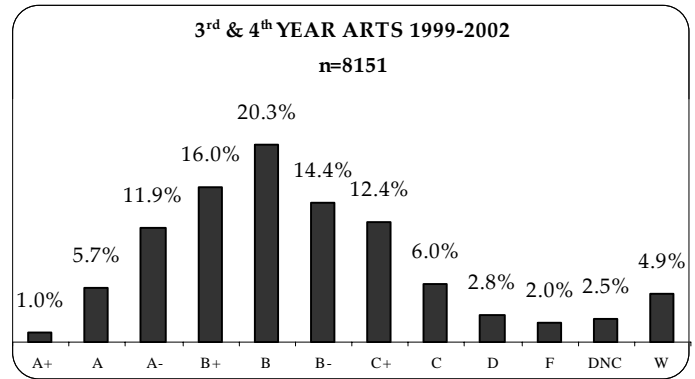
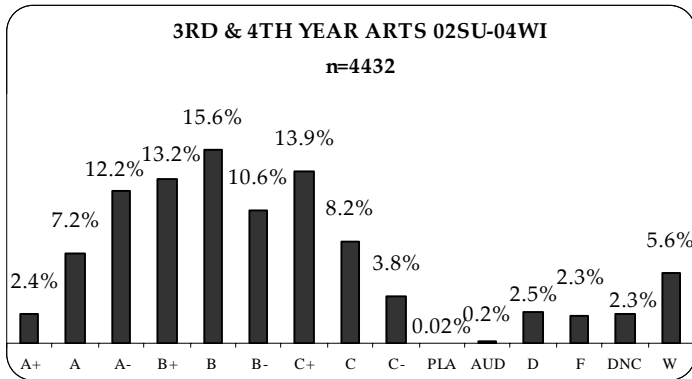

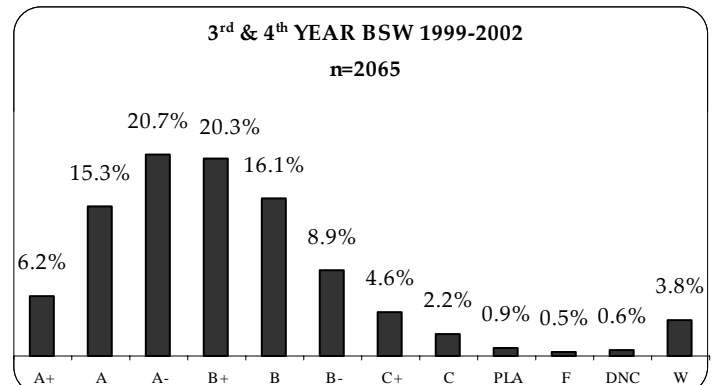
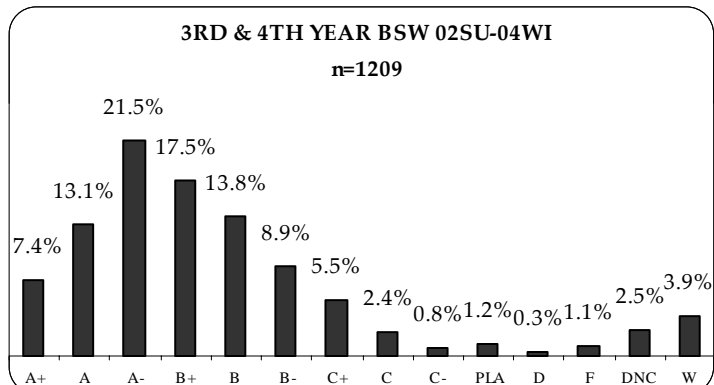
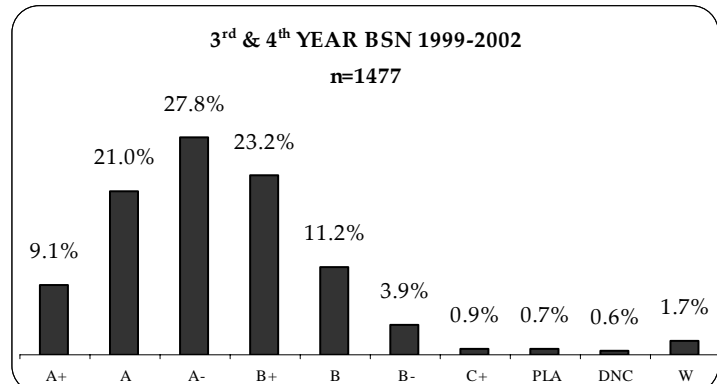
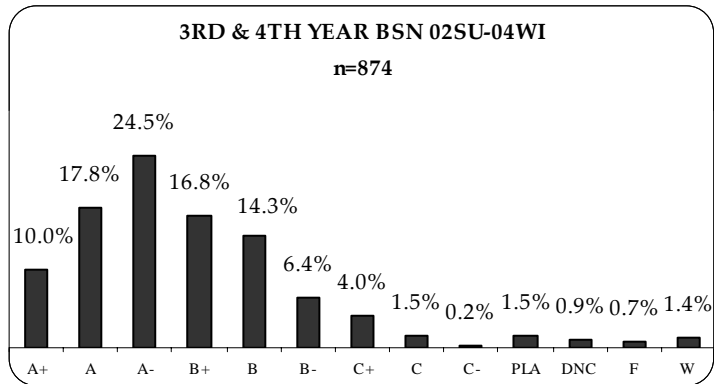
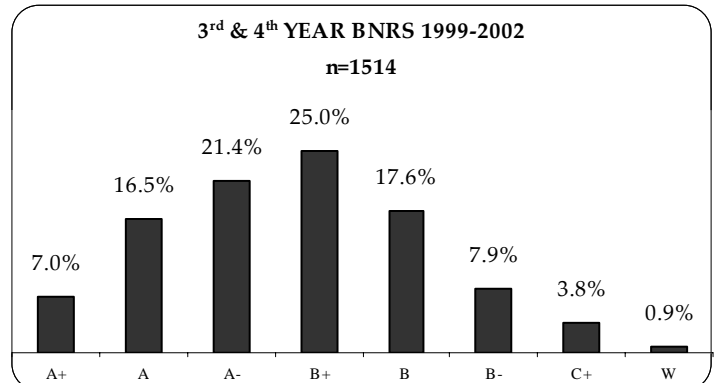
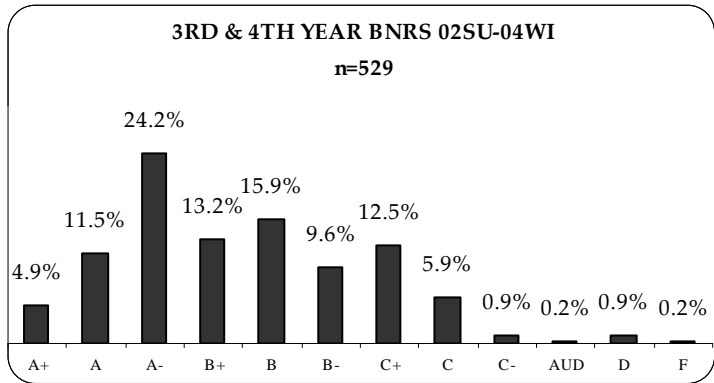
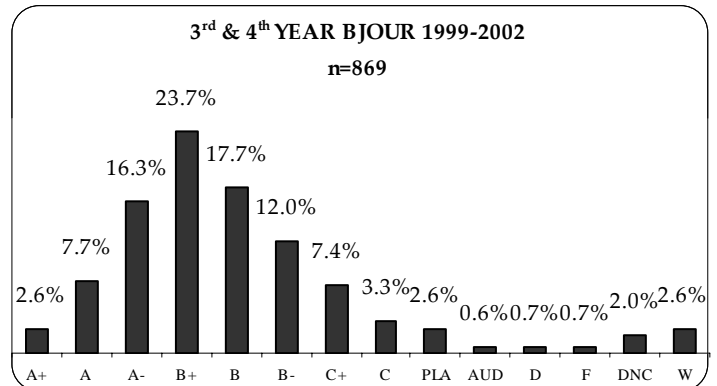
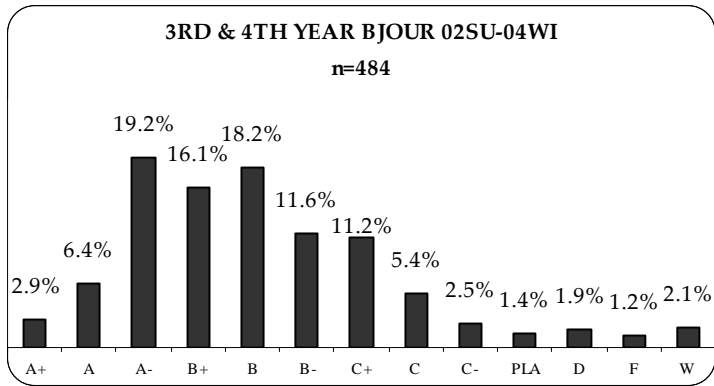


UCC PROFESSIONAL DEGREES GRADE DISTRIBUTIONS – UPPER LEVEL



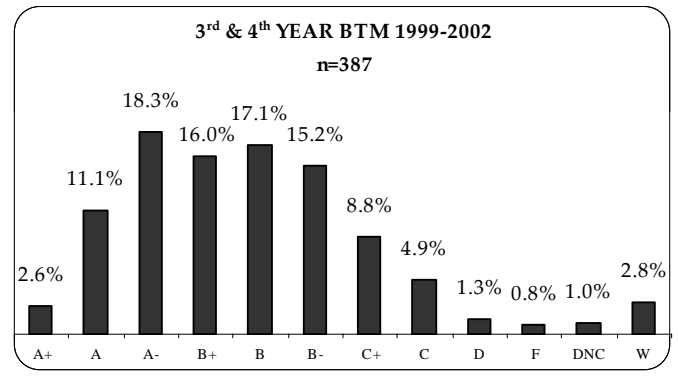
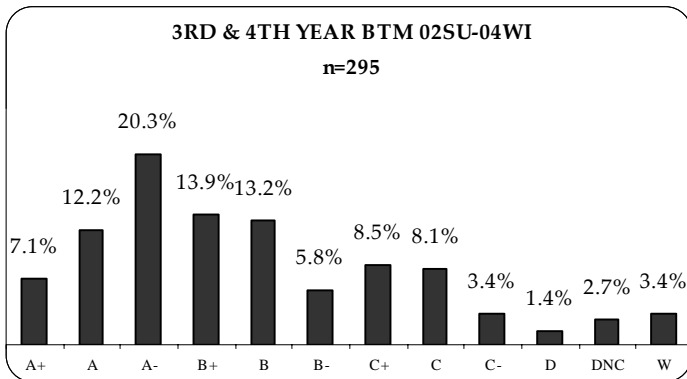
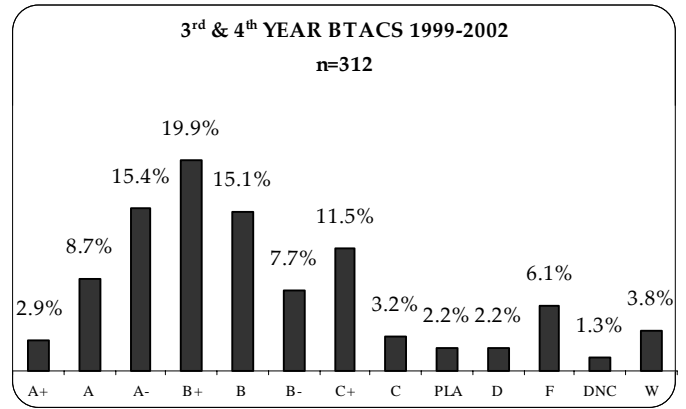
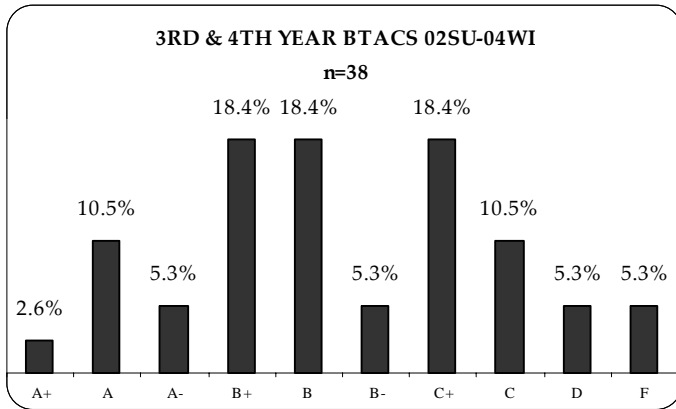

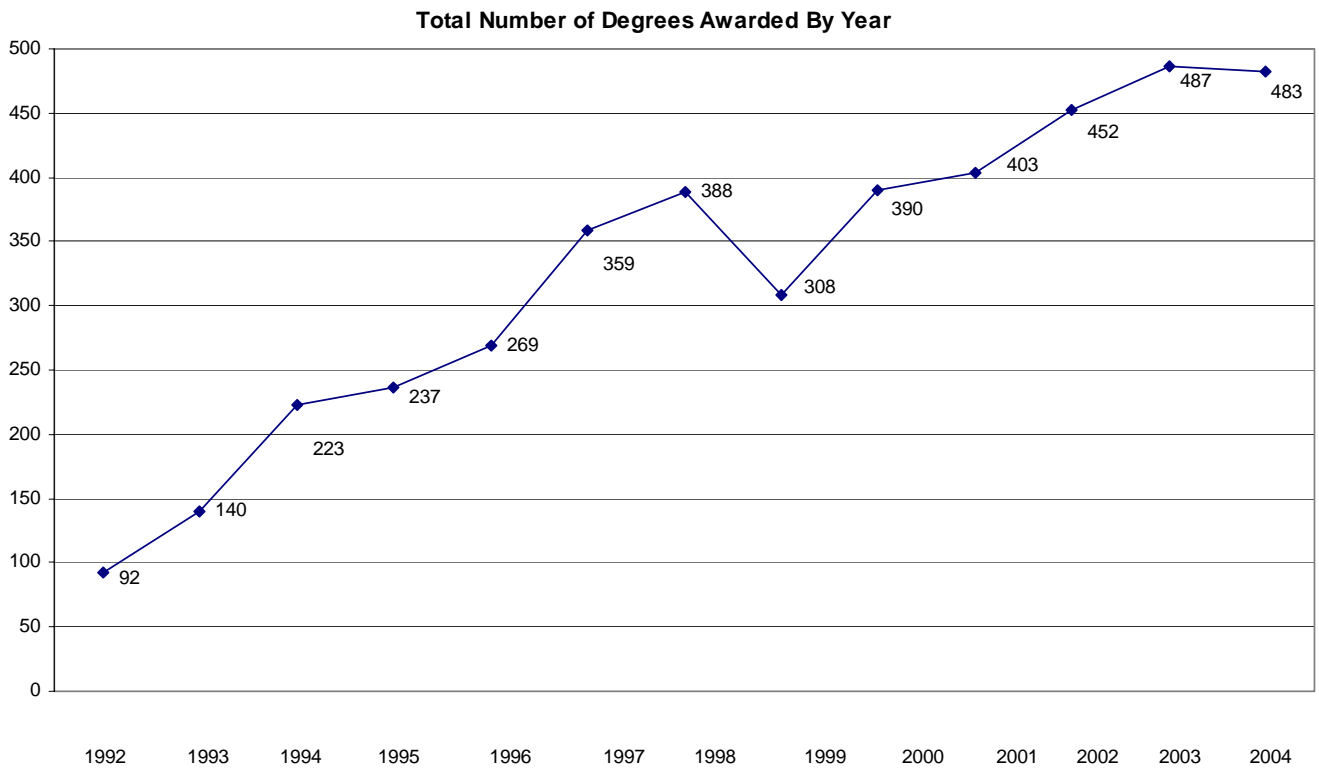
Credentials Awarded at UCC: 1995 to 2004
